Bingo is a game of chance in which each player matches the numbers printed in different arrangement on cards.

Types of cards

There are two types of Bingo cards. One is a 5x5 grid meant for 75-ball Bingo, which is largely played in the U.S. The other uses a 9x3 grid for U.K. style "Housie" or 90-ball Bingo.

75-ball bingo cards

Players use cards that feature five columns of five squares each, with every square containing a number (except the middle square, which is designated a "FREE" space). The columns are labeled "B" (numbers 1-15), "I" (numbers 16-30), "N" (numbers 31-45), "G" (numbers 46-60), and "O" (numbers 61-75).

(Bingo cont'd)

The history of Bingo in North America: Hugh J. Ward who, 'Invented' his version of Bingo, called, 'Beano,' because beans were used as markers, he operated it at Pittsburgh carnivals, took it nationwide in 1924 and secured a copyright on the game and wrote a book on the Rules in 1933.

However, it was apparently Edwin S. Lowe who copyrighted the word, 'Bingo,' and wrote the book on the game in 1933.

The version of Bingo that we are used to today effectively started in the United States and is loosely based on the Italian Lottery game that spread throughout Europe after starting in France. The original game of the Italian Lottery was more closely related to Keno than it was to Bingo and actually resembles the Rules of other Lottery drawings that are popular today. The key difference is drawn number lottery games in the United States is that multiple winning combinations, while possible, are usually consolidated into the one ticket that a player buys.

Bingo is played for fun but also has a large Gambling Industry in "Bingo Parlors" around the U.S. and is very popular in the United Kingdom.

UK version

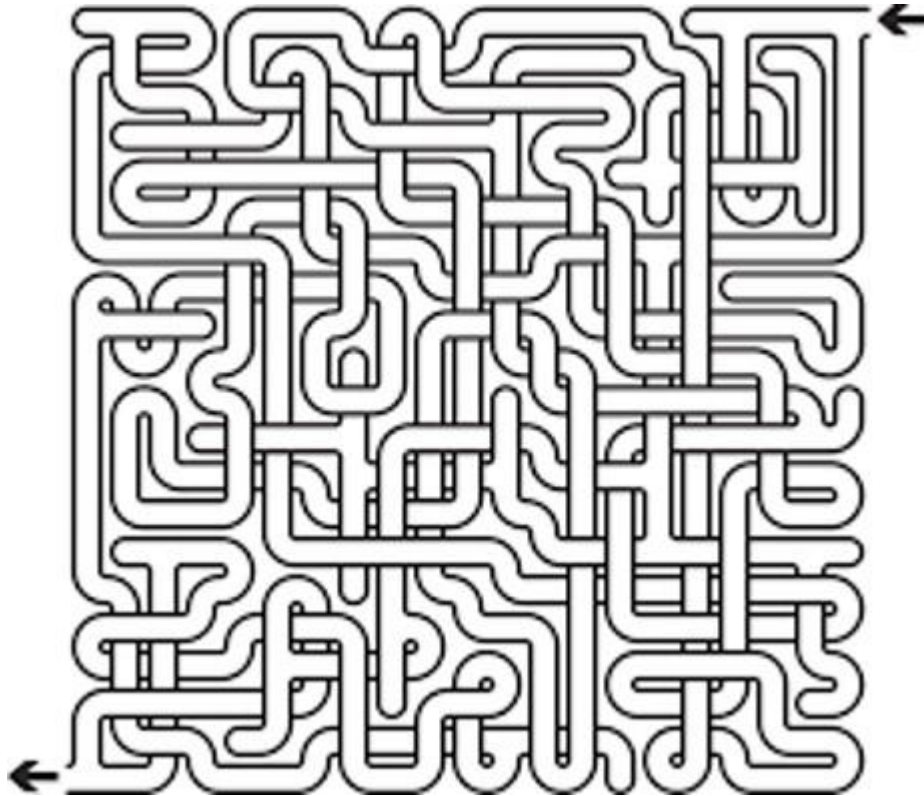
In UK bingo, or Housie, cards are usually called "tickets." The cards contain three rows and nine columns. Each row contains five numbers and four blank spaces randomly distributed along the row. Numbers are apportioned by column (1-9, 10-19, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50-59, 60-69, 70-79 and 80-90). Tickets are created as strips of 6, because this allows every number from 1 to 90 to appear across all six tickets. If they buy a full strip of six, it means that players are guaranteed to mark off a number every time a number is called.
