**Bologna**, also spelled baloney, is a sausage derived from the Italian mortadella, a similar-looking, finely ground pork sausage containing cubes of pork fat, originally from the city of Bologna Italy. Typical seasonings for bologna include black pepper, nutmeg, allspice, celery seed and coriander, and myrtle berries which give it its distinctive flavor.



U.S. government regulations require American bologna to be finely ground and without visible pieces of fat.

In North America, a simple and popular use is a bologna sandwich. Also known as a baloney sandwich, it is traditionally made from sliced bologna between slices of white bread, along with various condiments, such as mayonnaise, mustard, and ketchup.

The bologna sandwich is a regional specialty in the East, Midwest, Appalachia, and the South. It is a sandwich served at lunch counters of small, family-run markets that surround the Great Smoky Mountains, and fried bologna sandwiches can be found on restaurant menus in many places in the South. The fried version is likewise sometimes sold at concession stands in stadiums. (cont'd page 2)

**Bologna has a long history.** In 1661, mortadella (bologna's European cousin) was so protected, the papacy decided to create a clear definition to distinguish it from other, lesser versions of finely ground pork with chunks of fat.

Bologna came to America with the large German immigration at the turn of the twentieth century, establishing it as a de facto cuisine in the areas they settled in – midwest, Appalachia, Pennsylvania, and parts of the south.

From there, it quickly took firm footing as one of the most popular American foods.

**BOLOGNA TIMELINE**

1928

The coolest thing about sliced bread  
In 1928, bread slicers were commercialized forever changing the way Americans eat. Going from something available almost exclusively at deli counters to a homemade, bagged-lunch, pushed bologna sandwiches into ubiquity in the pre-Depression America.

1929-1939

During the Great Depression, bologna was one of the most accessible foods to Americans. It was affordable and it kept well for long periods of time. This made the bologna sandwich a mainstay for many Americans and, also, how it garnered the reputation as something consumed during hard times.





1963

Officially bologna  
In 1963, the New York Board of Education included bologna as an official lunch item, helping to feed the children in the country's largest public school system.
